September Program - Jacqui Beck

acqui Beck is an artist, art educator, and creativity coach living in Seattle, Washington. She has been teaching students of all ages for over twenty years. Her award-winning expressive acrylic paintings are collected and exhibited in the United States, Canada, Europe, and New Zealand and are available through Columbia City Gallery, Lynn Hanson Gallery, Karin Clarke Gallery at the Gordon (in Eugene OR), River Gallery (La Conner, WA), and the Museum of NW Art Store (La Conner WA). She has a master's degree in counseling psychology from the University of Victoria and is a



trained life coach and creativity coach. She has studied at Gage academy of Art and with many nationally known artists.

Artist Statement

I create paintings using acrylics and mixed media. My artwork is colorful, personal, and expressive, and I keep in mind both the depth and whimsy of life. I often paint animal totem protectors representing the fierce strength of ourselves and those who love us. This strength, ideally, is tempered by a sense of paradox, irony, and humor. We can't always recognize our protectors by their appearance (notice chickens, birds, cats, and various strange or imaginary animals). The most powerful beings have an understanding of and compassion for our uniqueness and fallibility.

Like life, painting is an unfolding process of intention and accident. I notice what shows up and decide what to keep or enhance and what to prune. The subject matter and meaning of my paintings are an exploration of what being a person means to me. I paint to explore my questions about life, about strength, fear, confusion, curiosity, and joy.

You can see Jacqui's demonstration at the September 26th General Meeting from 12:30 – 2:00 p.m.

Jacqui Beck will be our instructor for our **Fall Two-Day Workshop** scheduled for November 15th and 16th. A sign-up form will be available after our September general meeting.



One of the most popular traditions of Seattle Co-Arts is the regular Painting of the Month (POM) competition.

In pre-pandemic days, these competitions were held before the meetings, with members' framed paintings brought in to the in-person meetings at the Masonic Lodge. The artists' names were concealed, the paintings were given a tag with a letter of the alphabet, and were displayed along the northeast corner of the meeting room. Members were able to look at all the submissions, and in a designated time period, members would vote for three of their favorites. At the end of the meeting the three top POM winners would be announced, and they would receive their prize money.

That all changed in 2020. During the Covid pandemic the Painting of the Month entries were submitted online, with

members given instructions on how to vote by email. Many members found the new process to be easier and more convenient for those who cannot attend in-person meetings. Therefore, due to popular demand, the online process will continue. The online viewing will continue to give us the opportunity to look slowly and carefully at the variety of skilled works created by this group.

In addition to the Painting of the Month, members attending the in-person meetings at the Masonic Lodge are encouraged to bring their artwork (finished or in-progress) to the meetings. *Framing is not necessary*. The in-person element will give people a chance to see the work "up close and personal" and to chat with each other about techniques, thoughts, and ideas. This time also gives members a chance to greet old friends and meet new people.





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

our scholarship committee has been at work reviewing 37 applicants for the **Joan O'Byrne Memorial Scholarship**.



THAI SWEET POTATO AND CARROT SOUP (suitable for vegan, gluten free)

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 tablespoons non-butter butter
- 4 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1 sweet onion, chopped
- 1 (3/4) piece ginger, peeled and sliced
- 2 tablespoons coconut cream
- 1 pound baby carrots
- 2 sweet potatoes, peeled and chopped
- 3 cups "Tastes Like Chicken" or other chicken broth substitute
- 1 (13.5-ounce) can coconut milk

Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper

- 1/3 cup (3 bunches) fresh cilantro leaves
- 1/4 cup packed fresh basil leaves
- 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lime juice
- 2 tablespoons crushed peanuts

DIRECTIONS:

Melt butter in a large stockpot or Dutch oven over medium heat. Add garlic and onion and cook, stirring occasionally, until translucent, about 3-4 minutes. Stir in ginger and coconut milk until fragrant, about 1 minute.

Stir in carrots, sweet potatoes, stock and coconut milk, season with salt and pepper, to taste.


Bring to a boil, cover, reduce heat and simmer until carrots and sweet potatoes are tender, about 2025 minutes.

Remove from heat. Stir in cilantro, basil, and lime juice, season with salt and pepper to taste. Puree with an immersion blender until desired consistency is reached.

Serve immediately, garnished with peanuts, if desired.

Rewind: June 2023


Scott Ward Review by Sally Rawlings

cott Ward, Graphic Artist, Fine Artist and Illustrator of children's books gave a presentation that was every bit as charming as his playful and bright illustrations. Scott told of his journey from being the only "artistic kid" in his family, through his study of commercial design, his eventual leap into Fine Art, and eventual commissions to illustrate seven books, by five different authors.

After years of facilitating workshops to help people follow Julia Cameron's *The Artist's Way*, Scott eventually responded to the challenge,



himself. Using his oil paints to create paintings, he went beyond the security of commercial work, and was amazed and frightened by his instant success. Scott shared that it sometimes felt like a wild roller coaster ride: selling well, but sometimes hearing the negative little voices that plague most of us. Eventually he came to trust that he really does deserve to be a successful artist.



Scott described how he started working with the his first author, Wendy Boyer, whose book, *Where is Your Color?* is a delightful story about an anthropomorphized rainbow who gathers her colors. There have been many creative challenges as Scott has learned to collaborate with authors, who each have their own style. He works to deliver the illustrations the author wants, while remaining true to his own artistic standards and keeping himself entertained by playfully inserting various symbols and hidden words. He talked about his process of diagramming the allocation of space to text and artwork, and how he spreads it among the number of pages that are multiples of four. (If any of these pages is not used the author still needs to pay for what would be a blank page.) If a character appears multiple times in the book, the appearance needs to be consistent, so Scott

spends time to really get to know them.

Scott shared some of his creative processes and answered many questions. His working relationship is different with each author, but he usually inserts his own ideas, such as telling the "backstory" for which no words had been written. So much of his presentation was colorful and interesting, and many of his illustrations can be seen in the June issue of the SCA Newsletter.

Scott credits *The Artist's Way* for the "inner work" he has successfully done, and he plans to lead more workshops. Some of our members expressed interest in participating. He can be contacted via his website at **ScottWardArt.com**.


